INVESTIGATE **EVERYTHING** 

Next to your list of plastic things under investigation, write down what you think we can do to stop the plastic ending up in our oceans. Can we:

## REDUCE

Reduce use of these products in some way (for instance, why not take a reusable bag instead of a plastic carrier bags?).

## RECYCLE

If you have used your plastic carrier bag again and again until it's worn out, find out whether you can recycle the bag when it's no longer usable, through your household recycling, or by taking it back to your local supermarket to recycle.

## REUSE

Reuse something (reuse a plastic bag, and packaging, use them to make other things, even works of art).
